National Council of Negro Women, Inc. (NCNW) National History

The National Council of Negro Women, Inc. is a council of national African American women's organizations and community-based sections. NCNW was founded in 1935 by Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955) who called together 28 national women leaders to form "an organization of organizations – a council." This "council" would represent the concerns of Black women, bring organizations together, and give Black women the opportunity to realize their goals for social justice and human rights through united, constructive action. Today the mission of NCNW is to lead, develop and advocate for women of African descent as they support their families and communities. NCNW fulfills this purpose through research, advocacy, and national and community-based services and program on issues of health, education, and economic empowerment.

Capital Area Section of North Carolina – History

"Coming Together Is A Beginning, Keeping Together Is Progress, Working Together Is Success" is the motto of the National Council of Negro Women (NCNW)— Capital Area Section (CAS). This motto was the motivation for the vision of founders Christine B. Jones and Frances B. Grant who, in February 1997, established CAS.

Two years later, due to the unrelenting determination and strong leadership of founding members, the Capital Area Section was established. On April 24, 1999, a candlelight charter ceremony was held at Shaw University with 68 members in attendance.

We are proud to be celebrating 26 years of community service. Throughout the years, CAS has been blessed with many talented, dedicated and committed members who strongly embrace the needs of the community and work to advance the growth of African American women. This has been accomplished through committees and programs, such as Women's Center, Loaves and Fishes, and Raleigh Rescue Mission as well as other service projects.

The Capital Area Section is honored to have sponsored the charter of Shaw University and Saint Augustine's University Collegiate Sections in Raleigh, NC.

Pefore joining the City of Raleigh's senior management team as Assistant City Manager for Community in 2014, Mrs. Adams-David was the City Manager of the City of Hamlet, North Carolina for thirteen years. She served on the staff of that Richmond County municipality in various management roles for approximately 21 years. Throughout her tenure with the City of Raleigh, Marchell has managed the Police, Fire, Emergency Communications, Parks, Recreation & Cultural Resources, Human Resources, IT and Housing & Neighborhoods Depts., as well as the Offices of Internal Audit, Emergency Management & Special Events, and Equity and Inclusion.

As City Manager, Marchell manages the Police Department, the Deputy City Manager, three Assistant City Managers, the Chief of Administrative

Services and the Chief of Council Services.

She is proud of the work that she has done in Raleigh specifically, the reimagining of the RBTC into the Pathways Center where the city, community and workforce development converge in order to bring positive outcomes to those often marginalized, the strides made in developing affordable housing policies and plans and the implementation of the body-worn camera program to enhance trust and transparency between RPD and the community.

A true public servant, Marchell has committed her life to public service for the past 29 years. She views public service as a calling that is answered by those who place the community's need above their own. She has been active in many community organizations – the Alexander YMCA Board of Directors, YouThrive Board of Directors, Triangle Chapter of the American Red Cross, Local Govt. Federal Credit Union Advisory Council, Project REACH, Hillsborough Street Community Services Corporation, Triangle J Council of Govts. and state boards - N. C. Water Pollution Control System Operator's Certification Commission and the North Carolina Arts Council. She currently serves on the UNC Board of Visitors and the UNC School of Govt. Development Board.

The North Carolina native has received the following awards in recognition of her work with communities in both Wake and Richmond County: 2005 Lumber River Council of Governments Region N Manager of the Year, 2014 NAACP Humanitarian of the Year Award, 2018 NC Assistant City Manager of the Year and 2021 Raleigh-Apex NAACP President's Award, 2022 Government Employee of the Year – Hillsborough Street CSC.

Mrs. Adams-David received her bachelor's degree in public policy analysis (PUPA) with a specialization in state and local government administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she also received a master's degree in public administration (MPA) with a specialization in public management.

Additionally, she attends church at The Fountain of Raleigh and is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.



Wanda McCargo Community Development & Grassroots Advocate

n 2012, Mrs. Wanda McCargo founded the Southeast Raleigh Community Learning Center, Inc., (SERCLC) a non-profit organization established to support the needs of children and families in the Southeast Raleigh community. SERCLC currently operates a 21st Century Community Learning After-School Program for at-risk students in grades K -12 providing academic, creative arts, STEAM, and leadership development support. Wanda's Little Hands Educational Center, Inc (WLHEC) serves as a partner and a site location for grades K-2 while partnering with State Street Community Church as Site 2 for students grades 3 through high school. It must be noted that the program is offered free to approximately 64 students throughout the school year and continues a summer program for students as well.

As a Black woman in 19th century America, Bethune found that her freedoms were restricted. However, she did not let any of that stop her as she became a legendary educator and civil rights activist, seeking to change the way society treated both women and people of color. As Mary McLeod Bethune knew the value of education, Wanda McCargo has continued the legacy of Mary McLeod Bethune as a Community Development & Grassroots Advocate by also realizing that education is key to helping children succeed in society and recognizing the importance of involving families in the education of their children. The Parent Teacher Community Association (PTCA) was formed in 1998 to facilitate parents being integral partners in supporting the educational, emotional, and social development of their children.

Because of Mrs. McCargo's community efforts, her organization has been the recipient of numerous awards including the 2011 Raleigh Citizen's Advisory Council Neighborhood Recognition Award, the 2009 City of Raleigh Foster Grandparent Program Station of the Year Award, and the 2003-2004 Wake County Business Advisory Council Outstanding Employer Award. In 2016, WLHEC, Inc. was recognized as Childcare Center Program of the Year by the Public School Forum of North Carolina Center for Afterschool Programs. In 2017, Willie and Wanda McCargo were recognized by The Wendell Chapter of Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. and given the Everyday Hero/Humanitarian Award. In 2018, Mrs. Wanda McCargo won The Youth Outreach Award sponsored by The Light 103.9 Lamplighter Awards for her outstanding SERCLC nonprofit program.

According to Dorothy Height, "without community service, we would not have a strong quality of life. It's important to the person who serves as well as the recipient. It's the way in which we ourselves grow and develop." Wanda McCargo continues to shine her light through major contributions and community service through partnerships with several organizations. Under Terry's leadership, the SISI launched a national initiative, "Lift Your PEARLS And Check Your Girls" to bring national awareness, action and support of Black Women who die of Breast Cancer at a 42% higher rate than their white counterparts. This yearlong movement is working with organizations, hospitals, sororities, churches and communities around the nation to help ONE MILLION Black Women get mammograms to help break the cycle of high morbidity. Hundreds of women around the country have already taken the pledge and gotten their mammograms. The Rickey Smiley Morning Show and other media outlets picked up the effort and have joined the partnership. Terry was a guest on the show several times to discuss the disparities in a clarion call to action. She is also founder of the Small PEARLS (Preparing Elegant And Ready Leaders for Success) Academy, a leadership development mentoring program for girls ages 7-17 and has gifted fourteen Scholarships to high school graduates of the program to further their education in higher learning. She is honored to be Author In Residence at Lincoln University for the Department of Student Success, Health and Wellness.

With a relentless commitment to excellence, impact and winning results she is a highly sought-after Publicist. She served as the Publicist for ASALH, the Association for the Study of African American Life and History founded by Dr. Carter G. Woodson in Washington, DC and worked closely with the Obama Administration. Her agency was the first official Public Relations firm for the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., under the tenure of Dr. Antonio F. Knox, Sr., 40th Grand Basileus. Jacqueline Mims Tibbs Stars in STEAM

The movie Hidden Figures highlights the historical women of color whose meticulous calculations helped the U.S. catch up in the "space race" and send John Glenn into orbit around Earth. But NASA had many such "hidden figures," and one of the most notable is engineer and former rocket scientist Jacqueline Mims Tibbs, who was the first Black Government employee to be certified as a ground controller for NASA unmanned spacecraft.

Jacqueline's first full-time position with NASA was as Aerospace Technologist, where she programmed data telemetry processing systems on board in-orbit satellites. The code she developed made secure transmission of data from the satellite to the ground station possible and enabled the world to see graphical images of outer space.

Jacqueline's last mission was on the Wide Field Infrared Explorer (WIRE), which attempted to determine how stars were formed. She became part of the team that transitioned WIRE satellite operations to the Operations Control Center at Bowie State University, which has given students at a historically black university the tools and credentials necessary for flying satellites.

Jacqueline has received numerous awards for her achievements and uplift of youth in science, tech, engineering, and math (STEM):

- Trumpet Award, which honors the accomplishments of Black Americans who have succeeded against immense odds and inspire success in others (Honorees include Mohammed Ali, Thurgood Marshall, Beyoncé, Ray Charles, and Magic Johnson)
- Most Promising Engineer in Government by US Black Engineer
- Government Leadership by Woman of Color in Technology
- Top Ten Minority Women in Science and Engineering by National Technical Association
- Global Voice of Inspiration by iChange Nations
- Outstanding MBA of the Year by National Black MBA Association
- Inaugural Hall of Fame Inductee by Towson's Black Alumni Alliance
- World Greatness Humanitarian

Jacqueline decided to accept another challenge by adding Entrepreneur to her list of accomplishments. Mims is CEO and Founder of My Global STEM Academy, a not for profit with a mission to equip and empower students with exposure and skills that will prepare them to excel in the 21st century.

Jacqueline is also a highly sought after Award-Winning International Speaker, Author, Women's Advocate and College Educator. She has traveled to Guyana, Kenya and Uganda empowering women and youth and issuing a call to action for all to dream bigger and to be willing to perform the work necessary to bring dreams into reality.



Sandra Dubose Host, Entertainer

Sandra DuBose is a national women's empowerment speaker, personal development and leadership coach, and multi-talented performing artist. She is a Renaissance Woman affectionately known as the Bald Beauty Queen, but despite the confident way in which she wears it, she is NOT bald by choice. At the age of twenty-five, DuBose began her journey with the incurable autoimmune disease, Alopecia Areata. Within three years, she had permanently lost all the hair on her scalp and body which caused her to experience feelings of depression and low self-esteem. She uncomfortably hid her baldness underneath a wig for years; however, through much soul-searching, spiritual development, mental fortitude and by using the foundation of principles she teaches as a Certified John

C. Maxwell Leadership and Personal Development Coach, Sandra has reclaimed her confidence and turned that pain into a source of power.

Her life altering experience ignited her passion and illuminated her purpose. She vowed to use her voice and artistry to advocate for autoimmune disease awareness, empower women, and equip others with the tools to embrace change, and develop the courage to be their authentic self regardless of their challenges. In 2011, she made North Carolina history when she competed bald in a statewide beauty pageant and was crowned – Mrs. Black North Carolina. Through her leadership within the community, she has become a recipient of numerous awards, and is also the author of "My Crown and Glory, It's Not about the Hair."

In addition to using her voice to uplift others, this native New Yorker is a dynamic vocalist and actress. Throughout her career, she has graced the stage with notable acts such as El DeBarge, Tony Terry, and Edwin Hawkins.
